



Focus on protected areas

Lozère has 5 nature regions, as well as dozens of exceptional natural sites. Among the most famous are the Causses and Cévennes (UNESCO site), the Cévennes National Park and the Aubrac Regional Nature Park.

The Causses and Cévennes: the UNESCO giant!

Covering an area of some 3,000 km2, the "Causses and Cévennes" are the biggest site listed by UNESCO in mainland France! Over half of the area listed as a "Mediterranean Agro-Pastoral Cultural Landscape" in 2011 is in Lozère. To explore the Causses and Cévennes, there are several different options: you can meet up with the "Causses and Cévennes" Ambassadors (local inhabitants selected for their love of the region); visit a farm or even spend the night there; take part in the sheep transhumances in spring; enjoy a hike along the "agro-pastoral pathways" around the GR68 trail or stroll between the market stalls and stock up on tasty regional specialities...

The Cévennes National Park, unique and authentic

The Cévennes National Park is the only French national park in a region of medium-altitude mountains. It is also the only one that is inhabited all the way to the centre. Over 80% of the "heart" of the park, the area with the rarest and most protected natural heritage, is in Lozère! Since 1985, the Park has also been listed as a "biosphere reserve" by UNESCO. And since 2018, it has been part of the very exclusive club of "dark-sky preserves" (DSP). The National Park is a real paradise for nature-lovers, with over 2,400 animal species and over 2,250 species of plants and trees! You can explore this exceptional environment on foot, by bike or on horseback, or by taking part in the themed excursions (astronomy, bird-watching, etc.) organised all through the summer.



Aubrac, the 53rd regional nature park in France

This mountain plateau reaches its highest point of 1469 metres at the Signal de Mailhebiau. Aubrac is a region of untamed nature and preserved traditions. In recognition of its important natural and cultural heritage, it became France's 53rd national park in May 2018. Aubrac extends beyond the north-east of Lozère. It is mainly a region of livestock farming. The cows have what looks like khol cosmetics around their large eyes. They provide a famous beef, the "Fleur d'Aubrac". Aubrac is also a land of unique landscapes, forged by volcanic activity. And the highlight? The 32m-high Déroc waterfall! Aubrac is a festive land, filled with life throughout the year: the transhumance at the end of May, the pilgrims on the Way of St James from April to October, the photo festival in late September...

The Scottish writer Robert Louis Stevenson was a hiking pioneer. He set off in 1878 on a journey through the Massif Central for pleasure – and to forget an unhappy love affair! With his donkey, Modestine, he walked for 12 days, from Monastier to Saint-Jean-du-Gard. He recounted his adventures in a book, "Travels with a Donkey in the Cévennes". In 1978, Stevenson's route became the GR70 hiking trail. The now legendary trail includes 9 stages in Lozère, with varied landscapes and profiles: from the pastureland of Margeride to the Cévennes valleys, via the mountain crests of Mont-Lozère. And to enjoy the trail at its best, there is nothing like a hike with a donkey! The journey becomes a contemplative experience, close to nature.

The timeless Way of St James

"J'ai fait le chemin" ("I've walked the Way"), you will hear people saying. Which "Way" are they talking about? The Way of St James or the Camino de Santiago is world-famous. The route follows the GR65 trail, also known as the Via Podiensis. This is a hiking legend, enjoyed both by pilgrims and hikers. The trail enters Lozère through the Margeride region, across forests and over hillsides. It then reaches Aubrac with its pasture, lakes and cows. In Nasbinals a section of the trail begins that has been listed as a World Heritage site since 1998. This is Aubrac in its pure state, with a perfect balance between natural and architectural heritage. A hike for the body and the soul, to share and to be alone.

Have you already hiked along these mythical GR trails? Plenty of others are waiting for you in Lozère! The Saint-Guilhem-le-Désert trail, a transhumance route between Aubrac, the Gorges du Tarn and Grands Causses; the Régordane trail with its tales from the history of Gévaudan and the Cévennes; the Urban V trail, in the footsteps of a Pope from Lozère... Lozère also has regional trails with circuits taking a few days, with the chance to explore a natural region in depth, as well as a host of PR trails – smaller, family-friendly trails to enjoy for a few hours or a day. And not forgetting the trail routes and competitions in inspirational, untamed landscapes!

Snowshoes and skiing at the heart of nature

Lozère has 6 ski resorts on a human scale in the Aubrac, Mont-Lozère and Margeride regions. This is an ideal "snow" destination for families and fans of wide-open spaces. On the mountain crests and in the forests, cross-country skiing is king, with up to 300 km of groomed slopes for all levels. Lozère is also a perfect spot for snowshoeing. When snow covers everything in sight, you feel like you are all alone in the world and you can trace out your own route. For Alpine skiing, Mont Lozère has 7 slopes and Aubrac has 3. This is an ideal, stress-free setting for first-time skiers! And to make sure everyone in the family is happy, Lozère also has some top-rated snowkite spots, sledging slopes and the chance to enjoy a first dog-sled ride...

Free-wheeling on the roads of Lozère

Is Lozère a good place for bicycle tourism? You bet! With plenty of country roads with little traffic, Lozère is ideal for all your cycling trips, from a few hours to several days. For bike fans, the highlight is the well-named "Tour de Lozère". It covers no less than 565 kilometres with 9,600 metres of altitude gain. Ideal for seasoned cyclists! Do you prefer something a bit shorter? Then what about the Tour du Mont-Lozère, with 108 kilometres and 4 mountain climbs? Or a ride along the Lot Valley, around fifty kilometres? This is the chance for fans of hill climbs to tackle the Lozère mountains, which are every bit as challenging as the Alps! Among the most popular climbs is the Col du Pré de la Dame, leaving from the town of Villefort, and listed as a 1st category ascent. But also the climb up the Croix Neuve. With an average gradient of 10.1%, it has posted plenty of problems for the riders on the Tour de France. This climb brought Laurent Jalabert a famous Tourstage win on 14 July 1995!

Whether you ride from lake to lake in the Aubrac region, launch an attack in the Causses, make your way along the Cévennes trails or follow the Allier Gorges you are guaranteed a feast for the eyes! Is the boot of your car too small to take your mountain bike along on holiday? Rest assured, you can easily find a bike to hire in Lozère, both for children and adults!

The trail is 1,380 km long, with 230 km in Lozère, and was specially designed for electric mountain bikes (never any need to carry your bike, plus listed accommodation). This is a chance to share a great experience with friends, no matter what your level! All along the XXL trail, you will enjoy a change of scenery and plenty of thrills. Among the highlights: the sight of Lac de Charpal surrounded by thick forests; the climb to the top of Mont-Lozère and the ride through the Gorges du Tarn. This is an incredible trail that you won't forget in a hurry...

Something extra: descend the Aigoual on a kick scooter!



A horse ride across the plains and the mountains

Lozère has always been a land of horses. Each year, the world's best riders get together in September and set off on the "160 kilometres of Florac", an endurance horse race finishing at the edge of the Cévennes. And there is nothing like experiencing the excitement yourself and coming to cheer them on! You can then set off in turn along the trails of Lozère. With rides from and to a fixed point or touring trips, everything is possible! Comfortably seated on your saddle, you can, for instance, ride across the Causse Méjean, a limestone plateau that looks strangely like a Mongolian landscape. Or journey across the flower-filled prairies of Margeride with a feast for the eyes and the nostrils. And if you don't have your own horse, no worries: you can hire one when you're here. http://fctl.fr/



Motorhomes, the hardest thing is to choose!

Or a stay in the centre of Mende, a step or two away from the shops and the cathedral? All this is possible in Lozère with our motorhome service areas. So don't hesitate to set off on holiday with your house on wheels: it will fit in perfectly with the Lozère landscape!

Do you have the car? We have the roadbook! For contemplative drivers, travel the "lakes route" in the Aubrac region, and take regular breaks to watch the sparkling reflections in the glacier lakes. If you love photography, then set off on a roadtrip to see the best spots in Lozère and capture your magic moments. We have listed no fewer than 60 very photogenic spots on our website, including waterfalls and panoramas. GPS coordinates, weather, equipment, best time to go: you can find all the information you need, so that your photos will be a sure-fire success! If you like nature, then visit the UNESCO-listed Causses and Cévennes with seven "all-inclusive" trails. On the programme: landscapes to decipher and plenty of villages and monuments to visit. 
The Corniche des Cévennes, the motor-cyclists' favourite scenic route

Are you a fan of motor bikes? Then you will love the Corniche des Cévennes! On the menu: about fifty kilometres of winding roads and panoramas in the Cévennes valleys. Before each new bend in the road, you feel the same suspense, the same excitement. You will want to go on and find out what is hiding behind the next turn, but sometimes to take a break, too, and enjoy the landscape laid out before you. You probably can't stop at each turn, so here's a tip: take a break when you get to the village of Le Pompidou and look out on L'Aultre, a 1km-long green prairie that seems to stretch out endlessly... And once you've finished the section from Saint-Jean-du-Gard to Florac, take a look at our motor-bike roadbook, featuring 15 circuits with something for everyone.

Fishing in the land of springs

Did you know? Lozère is nicknamed the "Pays des Sources" (Land of Sources). And for good reason, since all the rivers running through Lozère take their source here! The Tarn, Lot, Jonte, Allier, Gardons and the Truyère: you can choose between fly-fishing, fishing with natural bait, streamer fishing or fishing with decoys in clear, fish-filled waters. All the rivers in Lozère are listed in the 1st category, which is the top category for fishing. In your catch you might well find brown trout, a pure delight in a barbecue or "en papillote". Lozère is also famous for its "no kill" fishing sites in rivers and lakes. In fact, Lac de Charpal is the biggest "no kill" lake in France. From the bank, in a boat or in a float tube, with a guide or on your own, you can find some fine examples of perch and pike. www.lozerepeche.com



Top 5 swimming spots

- → Lac de Naussac. The lake covers 10 km² and is a bit like the sea, but without the waves!
- Lac de Villefort. Fine sand and a turquoise lagoon just for you...
- Atlantie water park. Whether it rains or snows, you can still get out your swimsuit!
- Sainte-Enimie Bridge. In summer, this really is the place to be.
- → The Martinet Waterfall. The River Gardon's hidden treasure... Shh, we didn't tell you!

Go down the River Tarn with the boatmen

In the company of a local boatman, get on board for a relaxing trip lasting about one hour. Your boatman will take you from the village of La Malène to the majestic Cirque des Baumes, during a fun-packed, 8km trip for adults and children. First of all, the village of La Croze. Then some strangely shaped rocks: a couple that have been dancing for an eternity and an odd-looking mushroom, where people try out bungee jumping. And finally, you sail cross the Straits, where the cliffs almost seem to be touching overhead. Your boatman will share stories about the Gorges and facts about the fauna, flora and local history. Because the local boatmen's story is quite unusual. Until 1905, there were no roads in the Gorges du Tarn. So to get around, you had to walk... or call on a boatman! www.gorgesdutarn.com



Something extra: standup paddle boarding at night!

After 7 pm, there are no more canoes on the River Tarn. Quiet returns to the Gorges... Well, almost, since this is when the animals come out. You can see herons, trout and beavers, and the stars, too: when you travel the Gorges at night on a paddleboard, you are in for an unforgettable experience. www.canoeblanc.com

Get ready for thrills!

Via ferrata for all

In Lozère, there are 6 freely accessible via ferrata trails! You just need to come with your equipment or to hire your harnesses, pulleys and snap-links locally. You can also call on the services of a guide. Once you've got all your gear... then the adventure begins! For a relaxing experience, head for the via ferratas in Les Rousses and Mende or the trail in Le Malzieu, the only via ferrata in France that is equipped for the visually impaired. For a more challenging experience, we recommend the trails in La Canourgue and Villefort. The latter is particularly special, since it looks down on Lac de Villefort, with a great panorama guaranteed from the zip-line! Last but not least, the via ferrata in Florac is ideal for the sport's experts: it is both dizzyingly high and physically challenging.

Journey to the centre of the Earth

Make your way between the vast limestone rocks. Be filled with wonder at the sight of the natural sculptures, the stalagmites and stalactites. Go beyond your limits in total darkness. Tempted by the adventure? Along with a guide, set off on a journey inside our planet's entrails. The Clujade or Castelbouc caves, an underground lake or boulder fields, horizontal or vertical potholing – the possibilities are almost endless. The south-west of Lozère has no shortage of cavities, with almost 1,500 caves and sinkholes in the area! And the good news is that potholing is not just reserved for adults. Children aged 4 and over can don a caving suit and have their share of thrills!

A climbing route for everyone

1,400: the number of climbing routes on the Lozère cliffs. So you can always find a rock face to suit you! From the granite cliffs of the Haut-Chassezac and Truyère Gorges, to the schist of Saint-Julien-du-Tournel, via the limestone Gorges de la Jonte and Gorges du Tarn, Lozère has a total of 20,000 metres of climbs. Ranging from 4a to 9a, from training sites to an adventure area, the climbing routes are aimed at both experienced climbers and beginners. In the Tarn and the Gorges de la Jonte, routes of over 100 metres climb up to the sky (and to the vultures!). Among the best known are "the west ridge" in the Cirque des Vases (6a) and the 21 routes of the "Tennessee" sector in the Cirque des Baumes (from 6a and over). So pull on your climbing shoes!

Canyoning, with the rivers as your slide

Canyoning is a high-energy, fun activity with nature as the venue. The narrow gorges become your slides. The cliffs turn into springboards. Pools are ideal for a swim. Sometimes you need to make your way through the holes dug out by the water in the rock. Or to get out your rope to abseil your way down. The Tapoul canyon is the pearl of the Cévennes. Here you can enjoy half a day of water sport, with jumps of 7 to 10 metres and a 25-metre zip-line splash! Near Mont Lozère, below the village of La Garde-Guérin, the Chassezac River will supply a full day of sensations. And a day for a complete change of scenery, too, inside 300m-deep granite gorges.

Really wild horses

This is the story of a Mongolian horse that has never been tamed by mankind: Przewalski's horses. To protect the endangered species, a few animals were taken to the Causse Méjean. And the causse (limestone plateau) looks very much like the Mongolian steppe! From 2004, horses were reintroduced back into their native land. But around twenty "takh" ("horses" in Mongolian) are still living in the Causse Méjean. In a former sheepfold in the village of Le Villaret, you can find out more about these wild animals in a photo exhibition, before getting to see them yourself through a telescope. Patience and a sense of observation are the watchwords, since the horses gallop freely across an area of 400 hectares!

With a wingspan of nearly 3 metres, vultures can be quite scary. For decades, they were mistreated. To the point where they were completely extinct in Lozère. But from the 1980s, efforts were made to give them a habitat and to reintroduce not one, but three species of vultures: the griffon, cinereous and bearded vultures. Egyptian vultures are migratory birds and returned here under their own steam in 1986! To get a good look at all these birds, head for the Gorges de la Jonte, where a panoramic viewpoint has been set up on the cliff side. With the help of telescopes, live broadcasts of nesting activity and exhibitions, you can learn a lot about these little-known birds... and watch with amazement at their majestic ballet.

The Beast of Gévaudan... and the wolves

If you have seen the film "Brotherhood of the Wolf", then you know the story of the Beast of Gévaudan. The savage beast killed around one hundred people between 1764 and 1767... particularly in Lozère. And yet a park for wolves was created here in 1985. The aim? To change people's minds about wolves, which suffered after the Beast of Gévaudan period. In the park, around one hundred wolves from 5 different sub-species are hiding in 20 hectares of vegetation. The wolves come from Poland, Canada, the Arctic, Siberia and Mongolia. Our guides can help you see them in a new light. But that won't stop you shuddering when you hear them howl. Especially in summer, during evening visits...

Will you hear the roar or not?

Imagine: you are in a forest at dusk. The autumn leaves are glowing red in the sun's last rays. Apart from the twigs cracking underfoot, everything is quiet. A few yards away, your guide suddenly stops still. He takes out his binoculars. He hands them to you. It is still a way off, but there's no mistaking it. A stag in all its splendour. You go closer still, in silence. You stay downwind. And hide behind a thicket. Then you wait. Suddenly, a sound breaks the night. The stag's roar! The walk to get there, the almost monastic silence: it is all quickly forgotten. You just know you have experienced something exceptional...

Close up to the colossus of the forests

Weighing up to 800 kilos and 3 metres long, European bison are real giants. They are, in fact, the biggest land mammals on our continent! And yet, at one time, they almost disappeared from Europe as a result of hunting. For their protection, 200 hectares of forests in a rough climate were set aside for them in Lozère. This is how the Sainte-Eulalie Bison Reserve came to be created! To pay a visit to some forty bisons living here in semi-liberty, you just need to board a horse-drawn carriage (or a sledge, in winter). Then you will enjoy a wonderful ride through the countryside with cute baby bisons as the main attraction! But the ride is also packed with thrills, since there are no fences between you and the site's inhabitants...



Something extra: a musher for a day

Further north, in the Aubrac area, it's the cows' turn to begin their journey on the Sunday closest to 25 May. On the Col de Bonnecombe, the herds receive a blessing and are celebrated in music. Then comes the time to share a dish of aligot. A treat for all ages!

A 100% Lozère cheese plate

People sometimes say that Lozère is like a cheese plate, because the choice is so vast! But you can never go wrong, because they're all good! The only difficulty is to balance the tastes on the plate. Fortunately, Sylvie, a cheese-maker in Mende, agreed to share with us the keys to a great cheese plate. Taste the cheeses in order for a delicious explosion of flavours on your palate.

- Sheep's camembert (Causses)
- 2 Pélardon (Cévennes)
- Cow's tome (Margeride)
- 4 Sheep's tome (Causses)
- 5 Laguiole Grand Aubrac (Aubrac)
- 6 Bleu des Causses (Gorges du Tarn)
- Roquefort (Causses)







The perfect aligot recipe

Ingredients (for 4 people): 1kg potatoes; 250g crème fraîche; 400g Aubrac tome cheese; salt; pepper; pressed garlic.

Method:

Mash the cooked potatoes. Add the crème fraîche. Season to taste (salt, pepper, garlic). When the purée is still nice and hot, add the cheese cut into slices. Stir over a medium heat until the cheese is completely melted. Then just pour the ribbons of aligot into a bowl! For a perfect dinner, serve with a slab of beef.

A buron + an aligot = pure delight!

Burons are solid buildings made out of granite. You can see them all over the Lozère pastureland. They were built from the 18th century onwards. Here shepherds would make cheese during the summer. Recently, several burons have been converted into restaurants serving delicious regional specialities. They all serve aligot (mashed potato with tome cheese and garlic), often along with Nasbinals sausage or Aubrac beef. A sheer delight! If you like the idea of enjoying an aligot while looking out over a glacier lake, then book your table at the Buron de Born or Buron de Cap Combattut. If you prefer to make your own aligot, then head for the Buron de la Treille, the last Aubrac buron that is still in business and where you can buy tome cheese. Then just follow our recipe!



The Château de Versailles' little brother

You have probably heard of the Château de Versailles... But did you know that it has a little brother in the Aubrac region? At an altitude of over 1,200 metres, the Château de la Baume owes its nickname, the "little Versailles of Gévaudan", to its rich interior decoration. The furniture, panelling, tapestries and paintings have a lot in common with the famous château near Paris. Why? Because the manufacturers in Versailles supplied the decoration for the Château de la Baume in the 18th century! The outside of the château is more austere, since it was built long before, in the early 17th century. This is an atypical château with a fascinating history, in a land once ruled over by powerful barons and the Beast of Gévaudan... www.chateaudelabaume.org

It seems that Asterix and Obelix may have had a second home in Lozère... How else can you explain the 154 menhirs in La Cham des Bondons? As you might have guessed, archaeologists have a different theory. In their view, the menhirs in the 2nd biggest megalithic site in France (after Carnac) were set up between the end of the Neolithic period and the Bronze Age. So they have been there for 4,000 years! It was a real feat to set up the stones, since the blocks of granite had to be transported for several hundred yards... and some of them are almost 6 metres long. A site you can visit on foot along a signposted trail.

Mende from the top!

Mende, the capital of Lozère, is at the heart of the region, in the green Lot Valley. This is a capital on a human scale, where it's great to walk through the medieval streets and gaze at Notre-Dame Bridge, dating from the 12th century, and the Penitents Tower, part of the ramparts that once surrounded the town. To enjoy the fresh air and to take the town's pulse, a walk on the banks of the Lot is in order. Along with the ducks and the joggers, you will see beautiful roofs in Philibert Delorme style that are typical of the Lot Valley. To round off your visit, head for the Cathedral, the highlight of the day! The idea of building the 84m-high Cathedral was launched by Pope Urban V, who was born in Lozère. You can go on a guided tour and climb the highest tower with a 360° view!

The "Causse Farm of Yestervear" was built from 1640 and was still a working farm until 1946. Inside the limestone walls, you can set off on a journey back in time. How did our ancestors manage to live in almost total independence? What were their secrets for collecting and saving on water? What tools did they use? Guided or non-guided visits, summer activities (including bread baked in a wood fire - delicious!) and a treasure hunt: the farm has something for everyone!




